Prayer is an invocation or act that seeks to activate a rapport with an object of worship through deliberate communication. In the narrow sense, the term refers to an act of supplication or intercession directed towards a deity (a god), or a deified ancestor. More generally, prayer can also have the purpose of thanksgiving or praise, and in comparative religion is closely associated with more abstract forms of meditation and with charms or spells.^[1]

Prayer can take a variety of forms: it can be part of a set liturgy or ritual, and it can be performed alone or in groups. Prayer may take the form of a hymn, incantation, formal creedal statement, or a spontaneous utterance in the praying person.

The act of prayer is attested in written sources as early as 5000 years ago. Today, most major religions involve prayer in one way or another; some ritualize the act, requiring a strict sequence of actions or placing a restriction on who is permitted to pray, while others teach that prayer may be practised spontaneously by anyone at any time.

Scientific studies regarding the use of prayer have mostly concentrated on its effect on the healing of sick or injured people. The efficacy of prayer in faith healing has been evaluated in numerous studies, with contradictory results.

- "beseeching the Lord" (Exodus 32:11)
- "pouring out the soul before the Lord" (<u>1 Samuel 1:15</u>)
- "praying and crying to <u>heaven</u>" (<u>2 Chronicles 32:20</u>)
- "seeking unto <u>God</u> and making supplication" (<u>Job 8:5</u>)
- "drawing near to <u>God</u>" (<u>Psalm 73:28</u>)
- "bowing the knees" (Ephesians 3:14)

We do not need to be well-spoken to talk to God. In fact, He hears what is in your heart, even if you can't express it well or even talk. And the Holy Spirit promises to express to the Father what you cannot.

"...<u>the Spirit</u> also helps our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself <u>intercedes for us</u> with groanings too deep for words..." —<u>Romans 8:26 NASB</u>

Prayer presupposes a <u>belief in</u> the personality of <u>God</u>, His ability and willingness to communicate with us, His personal control of all things and of all His <u>creatures</u> and all their actions.

Persistent and watchfully alert to specific needs:

Rather than being unfocused or vague in our prayers, we are to be on watchful alert for specific needs about which we should pray. The <u>Apostle Paul</u> urged,

"Devote yourselves to prayer, keeping alert in it with an attitude of <u>thanksgiving</u>..." —<u>Col. 4:2</u> <u>ESV</u>

The Greek verb *proskartereó* (προσκαρτερέω) translated "devote" above means to be steadfastly persistent and perseverant. Christ emphasizes persistent prayer in <u>Luke 11:5-10</u> and <u>Luke 18:1-8</u>.

"With all prayer and petition **pray at all times** in the <u>Spirit</u>, and with this in view, **be on the alert with all perseverance** and petition for all the saints..." —<u>Eph. 6:18 NASB</u>

"...devoted to prayer..." —<u>Romans 12:12b NASB</u>

"...continually devoting themselves to prayer..." -<u>Acts 1:14 NASB</u>

"pray without ceasing" —<u>1 Thessalonians 5:17 NASB</u>

Prayer is not optional for God's people:

Prayer is frequently commanded or referred to in <u>Scripture</u> (<u>Exodus 22:23</u>, <u>27</u>; <u>1 Kings</u> <u>3:5</u>; <u>Psalm 37:4</u>; <u>Isaiah 55:6</u>; <u>Joel 2:32</u>; <u>Ezek. 36:37</u>).

"If...My people who are called by My name <u>humble</u> themselves and **pray and seek My face** and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from <u>heaven</u>, will <u>forgive their sin</u> and will heal their land." —<u>2 Chronicles 7:13-14 NASB</u>

Quotations:

Acceptable prayer must be...

- sincere (<u>Hebrews 10:22</u>)
- offered with reverence and godly fear
- with a <u>humble</u> sense of our own insignificance as His <u>creation</u>
- and of our own <u>unworthiness</u> as <u>sinners</u>
- with unhesitating submission to God's <u>sovereign</u> will
- Prayer must also be offered in <u>faith</u> that <u>God</u> exists, and is the hearer and answerer of prayer, and that He will fulfil <u>His word</u>.

"Ask, and ye shall receive" (<u>Matthew 7:7,8</u>; <u>21:22</u>; <u>Mark 11:24</u>; <u>John 14:13-14</u>).

and, generally, in the name of <u>Jesus Christ</u> (<u>16:23-24</u>; <u>15:16</u>; <u>Ephesians 2:18</u>; <u>5:20</u>; <u>Col.</u>
 <u>3:17</u>; <u>1 Peter 2:5</u>)

No rules are laid down anywhere in <u>Scripture</u> for the physical posture to be assumed by the suppliant (hands folded, hands held up, kneeling, stretched out with face on the ground, etc.). However, there is mention made of...

- kneeling in prayer (<u>1 Kings 8:54</u>; <u>2 Chronicles 6:13</u>; <u>Psalm 95:6</u>; <u>Isaiah 45:23</u>; <u>Luke</u> <u>22:41</u>; <u>Acts 7:60</u>; <u>9:40</u>; <u>Ephesians 3:14</u>, etc.)
- <u>bowing</u> and falling prostrate (<u>Genesis 24:26, 52</u>; <u>Exodus 4:31</u>; <u>12:27</u>; <u>Matthew</u> <u>26:39</u>; <u>Mark 14:35</u>, etc.)
- spreading out the hands (<u>1 Kings 8:22</u>, <u>38</u>, <u>54</u>; <u>Psalm 28:2</u>; <u>63:4</u>; <u>88:9</u>; <u>1 Timothy 2:8</u>, etc.)
- standing (<u>1 Samuel 1:26</u>; <u>1 Kings 8:14</u>, <u>55</u>; <u>2 Chronicles 20:9</u>; <u>Mark 11:25</u>; <u>Luke</u> <u>18:11</u>, <u>13</u>).

Except for the "Lord's Prayer" (Matthew 6:9-13), which is, however, rather a model or pattern of prayer than a set prayer to be offered up, we have no special form of prayer for general use given us in <u>Scripture</u>.

Types of prayer:

There are different kinds of prayer:

- Thanksgiving (prayers of gratitude)
 - <u>THANKS</u>—Why should people and nations give thanks to their Creator? What does the Bible say about it? <u>Answer</u>
 - What should we thank God for, and how should we praise Him? <u>Answer</u>
 - <u>THANKFULNESS</u>—Tips for New and Growing Christians—<u>GO</u>
 - Are you thankful to God? <u>GO</u>
- <u>Confession</u> and <u>repentance</u>
- Secret prayers (<u>Matthew 6:6</u>)
- Social prayers (as in family prayers and social worship)
- Public prayers, in the service of the <u>sanctuary</u>
- Worship and true worshippers

Intercessory prayers (praying on behalf of others) is commanded.

"Is anyone among you sick? Then he must call for the <u>elders</u> of the <u>church</u> and they are to pray over him..." —<u>James 5:14a NASB</u>

"Pray for the peace of <u>Jerusalem</u>: 'May they prosper who love you.'" —<u>Psalm 122:6 NASB</u>

"On your walls, O Jerusalem, I have appointed watchmen; All day and all night they will never keep silent. You who remind the Lord, take no rest for yourselves..." —<u>Isaiah 62:6 NASB</u>

"...My servant Job will pray for you. For I will accept him so that I may not do with you according to your folly..." —<u>Job 42:8 NASB</u>

"...I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity." -1 Tim. 2:1-2 NASB

Praying for those in authority includes: our nation's leaders, our local government leaders, our <u>church</u> leaders (pastor, elders, ministry leaders, deacons and deaconeses), etc.

"...Thus you shall <u>bless</u> the sons of Israel. ..." —<u>Numbers 6:23 NASB</u>

Praying for God's guidance

"O <u>Lord</u>, I know that the path of [life of] a man is not in himself; It is not within [the limited ability of] man [even one at his best] to choose and direct his steps [in life]." —<u>Jeremiah</u> <u>10:23</u> Amplified Amplified Bible

"Direct my steps by Your word, And let no iniquity have dominion over me." —<u>Psalm 119:133 NKJV</u>

"I am the Lord your God, who teaches you to profit, who leads you in the way you should go." —<u>Isaiah 48:17 NASB</u>, ESV

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart,

And lean not on your own understanding;

In all your ways acknowledge Him,

And He shall direct [Or make smooth or straight] your paths." — Proverbs 3:5-6 NKJV

Prayers of <u>blessing</u>

 Prayers for punishment—calling for <u>God's righteous judgment</u> on enemies of God and persecutors of His people / It is acceptable for God's righteous people to do this where warranted (<u>Psalm 109:14-15</u>).

Examples of answered prayers in the Bible



the prophet Isaiah praying

- <u>Abraham's</u> servant prayed to <u>God</u>, and <u>God</u> directed him to the person who should be <u>wife</u> to his master's son and heir (<u>Genesis 24:10-20</u>).
- Jacob prayed to God, and God inclined the heart of his irritated brother, so that they
 met in peace and friendship (Genesis 32:24-30; 33:1-4).
- <u>Samson</u> prayed to <u>God</u>, and <u>God</u> showed him a well where he quenched his burning thirst, and so lived to judge Israel (<u>Judges 15:18-20</u>).
- <u>David</u> prayed, and <u>God</u> defeated the counsel of <u>Ahithophel</u> (<u>2 Samuel 15:31</u>; <u>16:20-</u> <u>23</u>; <u>17:14-23</u>).
- <u>Daniel</u> prayed, and <u>God</u> enabled him both to tell <u>Nebuchadnezzar</u> his dream and to give the interpretation of it (<u>Dan. 2:16-23</u>).
- <u>Nehemiah</u> prayed, and <u>God</u> inclined the heart of the <u>king</u> of <u>Persia</u> to grant him leave of absence to visit and rebuild <u>Jerusalem</u> (<u>Neh. 1:11</u>; <u>2:1-6</u>).
- <u>Esther</u> and <u>Mordecai</u> prayed, and <u>God</u> defeated the purpose of <u>Haman</u>, and saved the <u>Jews</u> from destruction (<u>Esther 4:15-17</u>; <u>6:7-8</u>).
- The believers in <u>Jerusalem</u> prayed, and <u>God</u> opened the <u>prison</u> doors and set <u>Peter</u> at liberty, when <u>Herod</u> had resolved upon his death (<u>Acts 12:1-12</u>).
- <u>Paul</u> prayed that the <u>thorn in the flesh</u> might be removed, and his prayer brought a large increase of spiritual strength, while the thorn perhaps remained (<u>2 Corinthians 12:7-10</u>).

We have very many Biblical testimonies that prayers have been answered (<u>Psalm</u> <u>3:4; 4:1; 6:8; 18:6; 28:6; 30:2; 34:4; 118:5; James 5:16-18</u>, etc.).
